


WHAT IS THE COMMUNITY DATA PROGRAM?

Origins of the program

- Established in the 1990s
- Data cost sharing strategy
- From Statistics Canada primarily
- Analyze and report on socioeconomic trends
- Focus on small area geography





The Community Program Today

- Organizations across Canada came together originally to purchase urban poverty data
- Today, CDP provides access to a wealth of unique data products and serves the needs of hundreds of organizations
- Local community data consortia participate in the national network, providing leadership and oversight
- The consortium model has evolved into a tool for community development

What is a consortium?

- Legal group of organizations focused on the implementation of a public service goal
- Established at the community level
- Multi-stakeholder, multi-sector
- Comes together to acquire data
- Functions as a Community Development entity


Community Data Downloads










Ontario Works Service Plan, 2013-2014









The Region of Peel Ward Profiles, 2015

Living in the Red: Exploring Winnipeg's Debt-scape, 2015








Simcoe County Census and NHS bulletins, 2016


The Parent Resource Centre's Eastern Region Community Profiles, 2016


